

Motor Vehicle Record Guidelines

An acceptable driving record is one that does not include any of the following Major Violations:

In the past three years:

- ? Driving under the influence of alcohol or drugs (DUI, DWI)
- ? Homicide, manslaughter or assault arising out of the use of a vehicle
- ? Fleeing or eluding a police officer
- ? Chemical test refusal
- ? Leaving the scene of an accident
- ? Driving after suspension or revocation of license
- ? Three or more preventable accidents
(All accidents will be considered preventable unless documented proof can be produced to show the employee was not at fault.)
- ? Passing a stopped school bus
- ? Reckless driving
- ? Careless driving
- ? Any other violation or incident determined by Risk Management to be a "major" violation

The chart below provides a guideline to determine acceptable driving records. Any major violation (as listed above) will automatically be considered "poor".

*A **Minor Violation** is any violation that is not a Major Violation except for the following:

- ? Motor vehicle equipment, load or size requirement
- ? Improper/failure to display license plates
- ? Failure to have driver's license in possession (if valid license exists)

Note: An employee's eligibility to drive a County vehicle will be determined on a case-by-case basis utilizing the above criteria and other pertinent information as a guide.
